

Planes of Fame Features Dawn of the Jet Age

The Dawn of the Jet Age will be the subject of the monthly Living History Flying Event hosted by Planes of Fame Air Museum at the Chino Airport on Saturday, November 7. The event will begin at 10am with a seminar describing the early days of jet aviation and conclude with a flight demonstration by the Planes of Fame Lockheed T-33 Shooting Star.

America's most successful jet trainer, the T-33 was developed from the F-80 Shooting Star, the first jet fighter to serve in large numbers with the united States Air Force.

During this event, Planes of Fame will also take the opportunity to show off the restoration work in progress on the museum's Bell YP-59A Airacomet. America's very first jet airplane, the Airacomet was only produced in limited numbers, but it did serve to introduce America's military to the emerging challenges of the jet age. Now nearing the end of a very lengthy restoration effort, the Planes of Fame YP-59A Airacomet is expected to fly again at Chino in the early months of 2010.

Planes of Fame is open to the public every day, except Christmas and Thanksgiving, from 9am until 5pm. General admission is \$11, youngsters 5-11 are admitted for \$4 and admission is free for accompanied children under five. The Downtown Spectacle Known As Ghost Walk Riverside

rom its humble beginnings of listening to stories told by a volunteer sitting in a lawn chair in an alley to performances complete with costumed dancers, professional actors and original scored music, **Ghost Walk Riverside** has grown spectacularly over the past 18 years. Today, it is a popular Riverside tradition where coveted tickets often sell out in just days if not weeks.

The inaugural Ghost Walk was the brainchild of Kathy Allavie and served as a fundraiser to help save many of Downtown Riverside's historical buildings. Carhart as well as organized parents' groups worked tirelessly to ensure that the ballet company continued to have a home in Downtown Riverside.

"Ghost Walk is more than just a tradition for us, it is the reason why we are still able to perform," Elizabeth Landfield, CRB Board Member and the Producer/ Director of Ghost Walk Riverside for the past four years, said. "That's why every year we aim to make it bigger and better and more outstanding than the previous year. It's our little way of giving back to something that has given CRB so much."

In addition to the walking tours and the VIP experience, this year Ghost Walk is branching out to include a tour just for families with younger children. The Children's Carnival Mystery Tour is a walking tour packed with lighthearted suspense and all of the drama and excitement of a carnival, which is led by a Ringmaster of Ceremonies. The tour uniquely combines the flavor of Ghost Walk and the history of Riverside with artistic performances that are sure to delight children of all ages. The tour ends at a midway style arcade complete with games, cotton candy and popcorn.







Vigils are held and families often go to cemeteries to fix up the graves of their departed relatives.
