Pueblo a treasure in the desert

tions and history. A treasure that many locals aren't even aware of, though is Cabot's Pueblo Museum, located in Desert Hot Springs. The handmade Pueblo is world famous and houses a museum collection including Native American pottery and baskets, artifacts and other treasures.

The story begins in 1883 with Cabot Yerxa's birth in the Dakota Territories. Tour visitors take a look through his home at artifacts he collected as he journeyed to Mexico, Alaska, Cuba, and Paris. He returned from his travels to begin his "Castle in the Desert" and begin the founding of Desert Hot Springs.

The museum story also includes Yerxa's discovery of the international award-winning mineral springs and drinking water, perhaps the greatest natural resource to the residents of Desert Hot Springs. During his homesteading process from 1913-1918 he hand dug two wells: one hot mineral water, the other cold spring water.

The museum hosts thousands of visitors who delight in the history and connection to the past, making it one of the most popular attractions in Desert Hot Springs.

The Wilderness at the End of the Road

here the pavement ends and nature begins is artist Tony Caltabiano's domain. Caltabiano's "Wilderness" showcase at the Fontana Art Depot Gallery depicts the mystery of California's dwindling natural landscape using a combination of photography and painting "to capture the unique nuances of the area, portraying them in a haunting and spiritual light," Caltabiano said.

"Southern California is where I grew up, and I am drawn to the distinct species and topology of the area. I like the idea that I can walk in an area that hasn't changed in thousands of years."

Caltabiano still lives in California and currently teaches digital photographic processes while finishing his Masters of Fine Arts at Azusa Pacific University. Caltabiano's work has been shown in many locations around southern California, as well as in Miami and New York.

"Wilderness" will open the week of Oc-



tober 4 at the Fontana Art Depot Gallery. Caltabiano will personally showcase the exhibit at the Fontana Arts Depot Gallery's Family Art Night on Friday, Nov. 5.

Since he was young, Caltabiano has been interested in the California Wilderness. "Growing up in suburban southern California, I longed for a natural landscape I didn't

know," he said. "I began to explore some of the less known wilderness areas on the fringes of urban sprawl."

The art itself is otherworldly and haunting, using stark color to give the landscape an almost surreal quality. Much of this is due to the way Caltabiano photographs "with medium and large format film cameras, several of which are over half a century old," he said. The lenses and technique are important, "lenses begin to gain a unique 'feel' and 'look' to them as they wear, which yields a humility - and humanity - to the image that cannot be found in newer, modern optics," he said.

Adding to the photograph, Caltabiano will often paint into the image, "further pushing the distinction between realities," he said.



Garden railroad show brings the excitement of miniature locomotives to the Fairplex

he Southwest Garden Railroad Show will again spread the fun and excitement of garden railroading at The Fairplex in Pomona. With their garden railroad and the train museum, it is without a doubt the best place to hold such an event.

Trains fascinate those of all ages. Many of us have a train story to share, such as the memory of riding a train, playing with a train or of a relative that worked for the railroad. Trains touch the heart of almost everyone.

The Southwest Garden Railroad Show will be held Nov. 6-7 from 9am to 4pm.

The Fairplex Garden Railroad is considered the oldest and possibly the largest miniature railroad of its kind in the United States and possibly the world. The railroad began as a special static exhibit for the third Los Angeles Fair in 1924. It soon became a small, hand built, operating miniature train, in true 1/2 inch scale. The small railroad continued to grow and in 1935 moved out of the Fair's tent to its pres-





ent outdoor location. In May of 1997, with the help of members of a local garden railroad club, the original 1/2 inch scale was replaced with what is referred to as G gauge in the hobby of model railroading, and renovation of the miniature railroad began.

The Fairplex is also home of a railroad museum with a great collection of equipment and will be open during the show. The Railway and Locomotive Historical Society is a national organization founded in 1921. The society's work is devoted to the collecting and preservation of all types of railroad memorabilia and the sharing of the members' railroad interests.

G-gauge train is one of the larger sizes of model trains. Typically, they are placed in a garden outdoors. Numerous arboretums across the country now boast a garden railroad. Last year alone, *Garden Railroad Magazine* reported that 35 new public garden railroads were built around the country. Epcot at Disney World has had one for a number of years.

The best displays in the country, built by local clubs and hobbyists, will be available for viewing. They show the skills of master craftsmen in all aspects of scenery, custom buildings, and model railroading.

For kids 16 and under admission is free. Adults are \$10 or \$18 for a two day pass. The Fairplex is located at 1101 W. McKinley Ave. in Pomona.



They continue to be one of the industry's top grossing concert attractions and their "20 Years of Rock" CD was a bona fide Top 20 smash.

Michaels has also produced and written material for other artists including Stevie Nicks. He wrote and produced the song "Love's a Hard Game to Play" which appeared on Nicks' platinum album "Timespace: The Best Of Stevie Nicks." More recently Michaels could be heard providing background vocals along with Phil Vassar on the Kenny Chesney/Uncle Kracker duet single "Last Night Again."

Always creating, Michaels formed a film production company with actor Charlie


Sheen. The partnership ultimately led to Michaels writing, directing and starring in several films including "A Letter From Death Row" which he executive co-produced with Sheen.







early reading and how to incorporate books into their daily routines. The event will also focus on the importance of the parents' role to read early and read aloud to their sons and daughters.

"Current research overwhelmingly supports the importance of facilitating early and emerging literacy skills in preschool-age children as a critical foundation for literacy development," Karen Scott, Executive Director of First 5 San Bernardino, said. Studies have shown that children who are read to often are more successful in school, helps with their brain stimulation and builds their self esteem and listening skills.

Research shows that a child's brain develops most dramatically in the first five years and what parents and caregivers do during these years to support their child's growth will have a meaningful impact throughout life. Based on this research, California voters passed Proposition 10 in 1998, adding a 50 cents-per-pack tax on cigarettes to support programs for expectant parents and children ages 0 to 5.
