





McCormick's Palm Springs Classic Car Auction Now In Its 30th Year

rom a very humble beginning some 30 years ago, with just over 200 classic cars entered compared to this November's 18-19-20 Auction of now near 600 classic cars, McCormick's Classic Car Auction has just continued to grow at an outstanding pace. The event has now gone full circle returning to the Palm Springs Convention Center on a purpose built area to accommodate some \$15 million in classic cars up for bidding.

A family run business that employs 120 part-time people at each event, with many staff being with the company since year one, is a testimony to good honest business practices.

Just over 70% of all cars entered find new homes. Cars range in price from \$5,000 to over \$200,000+. Atendence at each event gets close to 20-thousand enthusiasts.

"Tire kickers and dreamers are more than welcome, because these people one day become buyers," said Keith McCormick, founder and Chairman of the company.


