Menopause The Musical has launched a women's movement that has superseded entertainment and become a must-see event. It is estimated that nearly 11 million women



More importantly, at a time when country and pop music were a twain that almost never met, Patsy was the first female country singer to achieve a pop hit in "Walkin' After Midnight," the first of many crossover successes. Mickey Thompson: First American to 400mph



ver the years, the hot rod industry has spawned numerous innovators, icons, entrepreneurs and heroes but perhaps none more prolific than the late Mickey Thompson. Murdered, along with his wife Trudi, in their Bradbury driveway in the spring of 1988, Mickey was larger than life and his life is the subject of a new exhibit: *Mickey Thompson: First American to 400 MPH* presented by Gale Banks Engineering. The exhibit opens to the public on Friday, February 12 at the Wally Parks NHRA Motorsports Museum at Fairplex Pomona.

Entrance is free that weekend.

According to Tracy Powell writing in *Automobile Quarterly* in 2007, Mickey participated in over 10,000 races, drove over one million race miles and set nearly 500 speed and endurance records, including 295 records at the Bonneville Salt Flats. He competed everywhere from the dry lakes of El Mirage to the brickyard at Indy and even the Baja 1000 and everywhere he made an indelible mark like no other.

Born Marion Lee Thompson Jr. on Dec 7, 1928, in San Fernando, Mickey undoubtedly

had two major issues to deal with growing up – his first name and second a strict police captain for a father. A family road trip in 1937 that took in those famed salt flats at Bonneville sealed his fate and by the time he was a teenager he was already building hot rods in his Alhambra back yard. By age 15 he was running a Model A Ford at El Mirage and got close to a class record with a speed of 79 mph.

Mickey's second passion was his first wife Judy and they married at age 19 while he worked at the Los Angeles Times and raced the dry lakes and drag strips of southern California. Notoriety came in 1952 when Mickey raced a chopped and extended Austin Bantam at Bonneville.

With two flathead Ford V8 engines it went 196 mph. That same year Mickey became enamored with the Carrera Panamericana, or Mexican Road Race as it was better known. In 1953, Mickey and friend Rodger Flores entered a '53 Ford Coupe. Unfortunately, although they were doing well, they crashed and five spectators were killed

resulting in lurid headlines in Life magazine. From Mexico Thompson headed to Bonneville where he used the Coupe as a push car for the Bantam, which now sported a Chrysler Hemi in place of one of the Ford V8s. Sadly, a motor exploded.

The following year Mickey and Rodger returned to Mexico with a Ford V8 and won their class. The event would be fortuitous when Mickey hooked up with Gene McManus of Goodyear tires and cemented a relationship that would last until his death and put the tire maker in the record books.

With too many ideas to sleep, Mickey continued to race by day and work nights at the LA Times and yet in April 1955 also took on the task of first building and then managing Lions Associated Drag Strip for the Lions Club. While manager, Thompson invented the staging lights that were eventually adopted throughout the sport. Mickey also invented energy-absorbing water-filled barrels which are still used as a highway safety device today. Mickey's brain never seemed to tire of thinking up and developing new stuff.

During the late-fifties, Mickey was prolific: Still working nights at the Times, running Lions, racing and record setting and developing his growing manufacturing business Mickey Thompson Enterprises. He also got into road racing at this time competing with his Cadillac-powered Kurtis in road races from Pomona to Palm Springs. However, a side trip to Bonneville on his way to race in the 1958 NHRA Nationals at Oklahoma City resulted in him becoming the fastest American ever when he ran 294 mph.

The drags were all but forgotten as MT now focused upon a major land speed project to combine four Pontiac motors and go 400 mph. Few took him seriously, but Thompson was not deterred and assembled the Challenger I in his El Monte garage in just nine months.

On Aug. 22, 1959, Challenger blistered across the Bonneville salt going 362 mph. It was not enough to break John Cobb's land speed record. Thompson returned the following year with GMC truck superchargers adapted to the top of each Pontiac. They gave the necessary oomph to boost Thompson's Challenger to a oneway best of 406.6 mph. Unfortunately, a broken drive shaft curtailed the attempt and Thompson never did ratify it. Instead, he turned his attention to America's other Mecca of speed, Indianapolis.

Here again Thompson's innovations upset the establishment when he entered a rear-engine, stock-block speedway car and designed and first used extremely wide, lowprofile tires that are now commonplace even on road cars.

The Search for Gertrude Tompkins Silver

The Search for Gertrude Tompkins Silver, a WASP pilot who disappeared under mysterious circumstances, will be the subject of the monthly Living History Flying Event hosted by Planes of Fame Air Museum at the Chino Airport on Saturday, February 6. The event will begin at 10am with a seminar by aviation archaeologist/author Gary Patrick Macha and conclude with a flight demonstration by a Planes of Fame North American P-51D Mustang fighter plane, the type flown by Silver.

Macha has been the driving force behind an ongoing effort to recover the remains of Silver and her P-51D Mustang. Of the 1,074 Women Air Force Service Pilots (WASPs) who ferried combat aircraft during World War II, 38 lost their lives in the effort. Of those

women lost, Gertrude Tompkins Silver is the only one still missing. She disappeared after taking off on a ferry flight from Mines Field (now the Los Angeles International Airport) on October 26, 1944. After extensive research, Macha is convinced that her Mustang crashed into Santa Monica Bay, and he has been directing an exhaustive search to find the crash site, which is probably under the water near Dockweiler Beach.

An independent, non-profit institution dedicated to the preservation of the artifacts and history of aviation, Planes of Fame was founded in 1957 as the very first permanent air museum in the American West and a pioneer in the concept of restoring historic aircraft like the P-51D Mustang to flying condition.

Planes of Fame is open to the public every day, except Christmas and Thanksgiving, from 9am until 5pm. General admission is \$11, youngsters 5-11 are admitted for \$4 and admission is free for accompanied children under five. 


