








he 18th annual Riverside Dickens Festival on Jan. 22 and 23, takes place earlier than in previous years and will be held inside and outside the Riverside Convention Center at 5th and Orange Streets and at the First Congregational Church. The festival is a cultural arts event, a tableau of 19th century life sometimes gay and colorful and other times serious and dark, celebrating the literary work of the world's most famous author, Charles Dickens.

A Legacy Continues

ater in the desert is a treasure. In 1913, Cabot Yerxa was homesteading and is credited as the man who discovered the now international award winning water that is so integral to Desert Hot Springs, also known as "The Spa City."

When Cabot was digging his wells, he reached natural hot springs in one area and cold springs in other areas, which led Cabot Yerxa to call his 160 acre ranch "Miracle Hill" back in 1913. That "miracle" of hot mineral water has been the inspiration for the spas and resorts since the 1940's.

"Cabot Yerxa was a founding father of what is now Desert Hot Springs," said Dr. Lorraine Becker, President of Cabot's Museum Foundation. "The museum is here to share the story of how those waters have shaped Desert Hot Springs and the Coachella Valley."

Celebrating that legacy is **Spa Tour 2011**, on February 3. Spa Tour guests will visit a dozen of Desert Hot Springs' world class spas including the famous Two Bunch Palms, as well as the new DogSpa. Cabot's Pueblo Museum will be hosting the opening reception for ticket holders of Spa Tour 2011. Tickets for Spa Tour 2011 are available on deserthotsprings.com or call the Desert Hot Springs Chamber of Commerce at (760) 329-6403.

Cabot's Pueblo Museum is a historic site which functioned as a trading past and museum in addition to being Cabot Yerxa's home. Cabot hand built this structure in an artistic manner with reclaimed, recycled and hand-made materials such as adobe bricks, telephone poles, windows and rail road ties. The main adobe styled building is up to four-stories at its highest point, 5000 square feet, with 35 rooms and has 150 windows and 65 doors. There are 14 separate buildings on the five acre Cabot's Museum Campus, all constructed by Cabot Yerxa from found materials. Today we call his visionary lifestyle and architecture "green" and sustainable living.

To celebrate Cabot Yerxa's lifestyle, Cabot's Pueblo Museum docents con-

tinue to share his story on guided tours. Cabot's Museum Foundation hosts key free events to share these ideas with guests.

Free upcoming events include the **Mata Ortiz Potter's Demonstration** and **Exhibit** on March 5-6, and **Earth Day Celebration** on April 23.

The Mata Ortiz pottery artists come from the Mata Ortiz Pueblo in Northern Mexico. Several years ago, Juan Quezada, revived this ancient Casas Grande pottery tradition training all the members of his extended family that reside at the Pueblo. Their unique ollas (pots) are hand crafted, not thrown on a wheel, hand-painted, using just a few human hairs and hand-fired. Guests to the museum during this free event will be able to meet the potters and experience ollas being created, painted and fired. Collectors prize the diversity of Mata Ortiz ollas in shape, size, design, color and pattern.

Earth Day is celebrated on Saturday, April 23. This event is free and features booths with demonstrations, interactive learning about green living, information and activities for the whole family.

"These events continue the legacy of sustainable living and creative inspiration that Cabot Yerxa left for us to appreciate," Mike Chedester, Vice-President Cabot's Museum Foundation, said.

Aircraft innovation and 'Skunk Works'

Planes of Fame event takes a look at the engineering innovators at the cutting edge

ockheed Aircraft Corporation's Advanced Development Projects organization, more popularly known as the "Skunk Works," will be the subject of the Planes of Fame Air Museum's Living History Flying Event at the Chino Airport on Saturday, Feb. 5. The event will begin at 10am with a seminar describing one of the world's most effective and innovative aeronautical engineering teams and conclude with a flight demonstration by the Planes of Fame Air Museum's P-38J Lightning fighter plane.

In 1943, with an established track record that included designs like the Lockheed P-38 Lightning, legendary aeronautical engineer Clarence L. "Kelly" Johnson was tasked with bringing together a team of Lockheed Aircraft Corporation engineers and manufacturing experts for the purpose of designing and building, quickly and in secret, America's first successful jet fighter plane, the XP-80 Shooting Star.

Initially working in a rented circus tent next to a manufacturing plant that emitted a strong odor, the team adopted the name "Skunk Works" from the Al Capp newspaper comic strip "Li'l Abner."

After the XP-80 Shooting Star, the "Skunk Works" team went on to develop many other exotic aircraft such as the U-2 Dragonlady and SR-71 Blackbird reconnaissance aircraft, and the F-117A Nighthawk stealth fighter. Operating

with a high degree of autonomy and unhampered by bureaucracy, the "Skunk Works" was noted for quick, quiet, low-cost work.

An independent, non-profit institution dedicated to preserving the history and artifacts of aviation, Planes of Fame Air Museum was the first permanent air museum in the American West and pioneer in the concept of restoring historic display aircraft to flying condition. Staffed primarily by a core of dedicated volunteers, the museum supports its operations with donations, admission fees, facilities rentals and proceeds from the use of its aircraft in various productions.

Planes of Fame Air Museum also has a special membership program available to the

public, with one of the advantages of membership being the opportunity to experience orientation flights in genuine warbirds. At each monthly Living History Flying Event, members in attendance can have their names entered into a drawing for a free warbird orientation flight.

Planes of Fame Air Museum is open to the public from 10am until 5pm Sunday through Friday, from 9am until 5pm on Saturday. General admission is \$11, youth 5-11 are admitted for \$4, and admission is free for accompanied children under five.







Dinosaurs in Our Backyard

oin Curator of Paleontology Eric Scott when he presents a lecture, "Dinosaurs in Our Backyard," on Sunday, Jan. 9 at the San Bernardino County Museum in Redlands. This 2pm presentation is included in paid museum admission.

"Want to find a dinosaur? You're in the right place!" Scott said. "North America is home to literally hundreds of thousands of dinosaur fossils. Many of the classic dinosaurs you've known about since childhood – Tyrannosaurus, Triceratops, Allosaurus, Apatosaurus, and Stegosaurus – were first discovered here in North America, and in life were native to this continent."




