# Mooneyes Exhibit Opens in January at NHRA

ally Parks NHRA Motorsports Museum will host a new exhibit celebrating the history of one of American motorsports' most iconic brands – Mooneyes. Mooneyes is one of the world's most recognized logos right up there with the Nike Swish and Apple's apple.

Dean Moon, the founder of Mooneyes, got his start right after WWII working on the oil rigs surrounding Pop Moon's Café in Norwalk, California. There he, older brother Buzz and members of the "Hutters" car club built numerous primitive hot rods. Like his contemporaries he started racing a hot rod Deuce at the dry lakes and the Santa Ana drags.

Unfortunately, his fledgling business was put on hold when he was drafted into the Korean War. The Air Force taught him photography which would prove an invaluable skill in his post-war business – Moon Automotive. The iconic logo came about while at collage, Dean saying, "When I typed my name, I'd hold the carriage off-center and put two periods in the OOs."

It was further developed when Dean sponsored Creighton Hunter's drag car which was numbered 00, pupils were an obvious addition. In 1957, Dean had a Disney artist draw the eyes as we know them today.

Ever creative, Dean invented a string of automotive products starting with a fuel block which he crafted from billet aluminum in high school shop before sand casting the production version. There soon followed a steady stream of products including the ubiquitous Moon fuel tanks and, of course, his most iconic offering, the Moon disc, all of which he photographed and marketed like a pro. Spun from aluminum, the discs found their way onto everything from lakes, drag and Indy cars to, well, the NASA Moon buggy.

Back in the fifties, Dean was selling 10,000 a month and they can still can be found on almost every land speed race car there is.


In 1962, Dean's shop was used by good friend Carroll Shelby to assemble the very first

Cobra, arguably America's most famous sports car. In 1964, Dean became the second president of SEMA (then the Speed Equipment Manufacturers' Association) and, like so many back then, helped build an international business along with an industry that now boasts sales of more than \$37 billion, all without so much as an MBA.

A member of the SEMA Hall of Fame, Dean Moon was a self-taught automotive pioneer and his achievements will be honored with a new exhibit at the Wally Parks NHRA Motorsports Museum. The exhibit will open on Friday, Jan. 27, in conjunction with the Grand National Roadster Show and will feature some of the famous Mooneyes race cars as well as artifacts, memorabilia and photography. # Meet the Bombers of the Eighth Air Force

ombers of the Eighth Air Force" will be the subject of the Living History Flying Event hosted by Planes of Fame Air Museum at the Chino Airport on Saturday, February 4, 2012. The event will begin at 10am with a seminar describing the mightiest aerial bombardment force ever assembled and conclude with a flight demonstration by the Planes of Fame Air Museum's North American B-2SJ Mitchell medium bomber.

Formally established on February 22, 1944, the Eighth Air Force was actually a re-designation of the U.S. Army Air Force's VIII Bomber Command which was established on January 19, 1942.

Eventually, to become the largest of the 16 numbered air forces deployed by the U.S. Army Air Forces in World War II, VIII Bomber Command's 97th Bombardment Group arrived in the United Kingdom on June 9, 1942 and flew its first combat mission, a strike by 12 Boeing B-17E Flying Fortresses against marshaling yards in France, on August 7, 1942. By February 1944, the Eighth Air Force was able to deploy over 1,000 four-engine bombers and more than 800 escorting fighter planes in attacks against the German heartland to spearhead the eventual Allied victory.

An independent, non-profit institution dedicated to preserving and inspiring interest in aviation, educating the public and honoring aviation pioneers and veterans, Planes of Fame Air Museum was the first permanent air museum in the American West and a pioneer in the concept of restoring historic display aircraft to flying condition. At each monthly Planes of Fame Living History Flying Event, members in attendance can

# The 80th Anniversary of the iconic 1932 Ford Deuce will be celebrated at the 2012 Grand **National Roadster Show**

he year 1932 is important in American history and culture. Franklin D. Roosevelt was elected to office at the forefront of the Depression; Amelia Earhart became the first female to complete a solo transatlantic

flight; the Yankees won their fourth straight World Series; and Ford Motor Company introduced the first affordable mass produced V-8 powered car - the 1932 Ford Model B also known as the "Deuce."

The Deuce is the quintessential car to modify into a hot rod. Its unique design and rarity have led to the construction of some of the most beautifully designed hot rods ever built.

Unfortunately, 1932 was the worst year in car sales history. This was mainly due to the Depression, but also because Ford's Model A had become obsolete. People wanted a more luxurious, sleeker, faster car, all the while being affordable to the average American.

Edsel, Henry Ford's only son, was the key designer of the Deuce. Edsel's design was a car for the masses. It was practical and aesthetically pleasing, making it a masterpiece of automotive design. The Deuce was on sale for only six months, solidifying it as a prized commodity.

The following year Ford introduced several design changes, while other car manufacturers followed his example of affordable, fast luxury cars. The Deuce marks the end of an era and sets the precedent of another.

In honor of the 80th Anniversary of the Deuce, there will be eighty driven Deuces on display January 27th - 29th at the Grand National Roadster Show, at the

Fairplex in Pomona. The Grand National Roadster Show features hundreds of the best hot rods, customs, muscle cars, motorcycles, street machines and classic trucks found anywhere in the world. The indoor show offers a

# Dr. Jack Poster: A Tribute to Harry James and Friends

aster trumpet artist Dr. Jack Poster will lead his 20-piece big band in "A Tribute to the Music of Harry James" on Sunday, Jan. 22, at the Indian Wells Theater at Cal State San Bernardino's Palm Desert Campus.

The concert, which begins at 2pm, features Poster, former lead trumpet with the Harry James Orchestra (1969-1971), as well as vocalists Troy Clarke and Cassie Miller. They will perform hits such as "That Old Black Magic," "I'm Beginning to See the Light," "Luck Be a Lady" and "Mack the Knife."

Poster, who holds a doctorate degree in music from Claremont Graduate School, has been on the cutting edge of the entertainment business ever since becoming a professional trumpet artist. He has an extensive performance background in all areas of music including jazz, pop, classical and midi sequencing. He is considered an expert in midi sequencing since becoming an operator in 1986. istening to "All of You," the third and most intriguing release from Colbie Caillat, is like turning a page of a book you've savored for two chapters only to be surprised and delighted by what awaits in Chapter 3.

This is, first of all, definitely and unmistakably a Caillat gem. Those qualities that burst from the first notes of her 2007 debut "Coco" like bouquets of sonic joy, and flowered in 2009's "Breakthrough," emanate from every track on "All of You." But now they bloom with a richness of emotion and insight that comes only when a gifted artist can channel lessons learned into her music.

"Coco" debuted at No. 5 and raced its way past the multi-Platinum barrier. Her first single, "Bubbly," caught a generation's imagination and has become one of the best-selling digital tracks of all time. Billboard took note by naming Caillat its Breakthrough Artist of the Year. Fittingly, "Breakthrough" broke at No. 1 and was honored with two Grammy nominations; that same year, Colbie won two Grammys for her collaborations with Jason Mraz and Taylor Swift.

She has sung the national anthem on the kickoff to the 2011 NFL season and performed at the Nobel Peace Concert in Oslo. She and her original music have been featured in commercials for cotton and in ABC Family Channel's "25 Days of Christmas," whose theme song she wrote and arranged. Her embrace has stretched to include work for honorable causes including the Surfrider Foundation, Save the Music and the Humane Society, for which she has recently become a spokesperson.
