Inner Tubing Gets A New Look At Big Bear Snow Play

raditional family inner tubing gets a whole new look at longtime favorite Big Bear Snow Play. For starters, inner tubes don't have to be just black. While some tubes are black at Big Bear Snow Play, many others are red, blue, even yellow thanks to colorful covers, making for better family photos to be sure.

Stretched out over each tube, the covers fill the donut hole at the bottom, creating more surface area for sliding thus making the ride even faster. Plus snow doesn't splatter up during the downhill descent either so guests keep their rears drier.

Runs don't have to be just straight downhill shots either. Big Bear Snow Play, which at one time was the Rebel Ridge ski area and now offers the longest tubing runs in Southern California, has up to eight traditional downhill lines but also incorporates whoop-di-doos on some runs too. It's a thrilling variation on the traditional pinwheeling rides on inner tubes.

At Big Bear Snow Play there's always plenty of white stuff to enjoy, regardless of what the weather does, thanks to state-of-the-art snowmaking. Lenko fan guns, like the ones used at ski resorts, blast jet streams of snow, and already depths are approaching 20 feet high... that's two stories high! As the season progresses depths will soar to 30 feet or more, enough snow to ensure tubing through Easter and beyond.

Getting to the top of all that snow is a snap thanks to Magic Carpet uphill lifts. No more tiring walks back to the top after each ride; guests just step onto the moving conveyor belts and are whisked back up for more fun. One lift is enclosed in Plexiglass for guest comfort on those chilly or snowy days and the second operates during busy periods to guarantee customers get all the downhill fun they can handle.

"(Magic Carpet lifts) are very convenient, especially when you have little kids," said Ryan Bradley during a recent visit with his two young children. "Walking up gets very frustrating. They don't make it very well."

Big Bear Snow Play also has a separate Kiddie Area for little ones.

When it's time for a break from the action, head indoors for a winter warmup. Big Bear Snow Play has a heated indoor base lodge with family-priced snack bar, video games and restrooms. Forget gloves or a hat? Big Bear Snow Play has those available too.

Picnic tables just steps from the slopes. Guests are welcome to bring their own lunches or come and go as they want.

Big Bear Snow Play is open daily for inner tubing from 10am to 4pm. Just \$30 buys a full day of play which includes tube rental and use of the Magic Carpet lifts.

 your imagination to work as we go back in time 70 years . . .

The Southern California home front during World War II supported the war effort in many ways, including a wide range of volunteer efforts and submitting to government-managed rationing and price controls. Everyone agreed that the sacrifices were for the national good "for the duration." Millions of students, retirees, housewives, and unemployed moved into the active labor force. Hours worked increased as leisure activities declined sharply. Most families were allocated only 3 gallons of gasoline a week, which sharply curtailed driving for any purpose. Production of most durable goods, like cars, new housing, vacuum cleaners, and kitchen appliances, was banned until the war ended. In industrial areas housing was in short supply as people doubled up and lived in cramped quarters. Prices and wages were controlled. Americans saved a high portion of their incomes, which led to renewed growth after the war.

During this time, Dewey and Maude Cable had moved to Southern California from Iowa to be farmers. Dewey's brother, John, was a pilot. He was considered a barnstormer, flew air mail for the Postal Service and he was a test pilot for Douglas Aircraft. John got Dewey up in the air in the '30s and that's all it took. Dewey fell in love with aviation, and so did Maude. A few years later, 1945 to be exact, Dewey carved out a couple of runways on some open land in what is now known as Upland. The rest is history....

It's the 70th anniversary of Cable Airport, the world's largest family owned and operated public use airport, home to more than 300 aircraft. Come join the celebration of days gone by as they take you back to 1945.

This year's Air Faire will consist of as many "old time" antique planes and cars as possible as they try to recreate the year 1945. Along with an aerial display of many of these aircraft, Dr. Frank Donnelly will wow the crowd with his engine out aerobatics and Dan Buchanan, without an engine, will entertain with his "Flying Colors".

oad to California Quilters Conference brings the appliqué artistry of the Tentmakers of Cairo to California for the first time ever! Curated by international textile artist Jenny Bowker, this exhibit sheds light on the ancient art of Egyptian tentmaking. This California premiere exhibit, "Stitch Like An Egyptian: Tentmakers of Cairo" hopes to make the world aware of the beautiful yet shrinking art of the few remaining Tentmakers who continue to ply their trade.

This ancient, intricate craft has been facing struggles, as machines try to replace hand-made items and unscrupulous businesses copy and sell their unique designs.

Road to California Quilters Conference is bringing this exhibition to the Ontario Convention Center to raise interest and awareness in this traditional, beautiful art.

The artists are from Khan Khayamiya—the Market of the Tentmakers in the heart of Old Islamic Cairo. Two of them, Hosam Hanafy Ahmed Mahmoud and Tarek Abdelhay Hafez Abouelenin, will be on hand at the exhibit to demonstrate their method of appliqué.

This ancient artwork used to line tents or screens covered in appliqué that could decorate a whole street. Curator Jenny Bowker notes: "There were tents found in Pharaonic tombs from 2,000 B.C. ... There are pictures in the Rameses panels at Abu Simbel of tents lined up." The brilliantly colored appliqué are still used for ceremonial purposes at weddings, funerals, henna parties, or Ramadan celebrations.

Today's quiltmakers recognize the skill needed for such beautiful and colorful appliqués. A thriving international demand for the work keeps the few remaining tentmakers in business.

The Lincoln Memorial Shrine Redlands' Civil War Era Secret

any in Southern California will be surprised to learn that the only museum, library, and research center dedicated to Abraham Lincoln and the Civil War west of the Mississippi River is right here in Redlands. Part of A.K. Smiley Public Library, the Lincoln Memorial Shrine was made possible by the philanthropy of Robert and Alma Watchorn in 1932.

Robert Watchorn, a poor immigrant from the coal mining region of England, came to the United States with a dream for a better life. His ambition led him beyond the coal mines of Pennsylvania and into government service, eventually rising to an appointment by President Theodore Roosevelt as Commissioner of Immigration at Ellis Island. Following his public service he entered private business, first through



a leadership role at the Union Oil Company, and then in his own venture, the Watchorn Oil and Gas Company.

When Watchorn and his wife became winter residents of Redlands in the 1920s, he was already enamored with Abraham Lincoln. He felt strongly that if citizens of other nations understood Lincoln, as he did, it would improve relationships between the United States and other countries. This interest in Lincoln led him to create the Lincoln Memorial Shrine, a building to house his impressive collection of Lincolniana.

Since that beginning in the stone octagon designed by noted southern California architect Elmer Grey, the Shrine has become a leading institution for the study of Lincoln and the Civil War on the west coast. Thousands of letters and diaries written by those involved in this national crisis have been added to the collections, as well as artwork and artifacts. The centerpiece of the collection is a Carrara marble bust of Lincoln sculpted by George Gray Barnard. In addition to more than thirty documents written or signed by Abraham Lincoln, dozens by members of his cabinet or high-ranking military officials, one of the most important items on exhibit is the painting "Thoughts on Peace on Lincoln's Birthday" by noted artist Norman Rockwell.

Numerous events are held at the Shrine each

American Indian Art In Riverside

Americana Indian Shows bring authentic Native American arts to the public

which more than 5,000 authentic items for sale, the **Anderson's Americana Indian Show** is perhaps the largest event of its kind to be found in the Inland Empire. For purveyors of traditional, Native American jewelry and arts, the Riverside show can't be beat.

Coming to the Elks Lodge in Riverside on January 23 – January 25, 2015, the show puts on display for sale everything from turquoise jewelry to Navajo rugs.

Americana Indian Shows had its beginning in 1947 when founder Lee Anderson (a fifth generation Arizonan) attended school on the Navajo reservation and worked after school and weekends for his uncle at the family's Sanders, Arizona trading post. The Andersons collected American Indian art such as Navajo rugs, pottery, baskets, jewelry and other Indian and western items. This cultivated a passion and respect for Native American art and culture that inspired Lee to pursue his dream of bringing Indian art to the public. In 1966 Lee and his brothers, Wayne and Arvid, began selling Navajo weavings on a small scale at local flea markets and events in Tucson, while Lee was stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. As sales grew, the brothers expanded inventory to include Jewelry and other Indian arts; with their success came the founding of Americana Indian shows in 1968.

Upon retirement from the Pentagon in 1974, Lee moved his family from Virginia back to Arizona to pursue the business full time with his brothers. Two galleries were opened in 1974, and at the same time road shows continued to take art and jewelry to customers across the country. Eventually the galleries were closed so Lee and his brothers could focus exclusively on conducting shows and sales nationwide.

Today that tradition continues with the next generation of Andersons. The shows – more than 25 a year around the country – feature an inventory of thousands of Native American made items from Arizona and New Mexico, including turquoise jewelry, kachinas, paintings, baskets, sand paintings, pottery,

carvings, Navajo rugs and more. Visitors can shop for works created by top Native American artists from the Navajo, Hopi, Zuni, Santo Domingo, Acoma, Santa Clara, Jemez and more.





have been fully restored, thanks to donations from the community.

The baby Jesus, wise men and other statues making up the 12 life-sized scenes have undergone a complete restoration this year, having been reconstructed and painted by Los Angeles artist Kim Healy Pretti as close to their original state as possible. Thousands of dollars were raised through community donations to repair the weathered and damaged displays, which were originally created in the 1950s by artist Rudolph Vargas, who painted some of the original jolly villains in Disneyland's Pirates of the Carribean ride, along with a legacy of religious statuary in churches all around Los Angeles – the largest displays of which were at Santa Teresita Hospital in Duarte: murals depicting the nativity and St. Joseph in his carpenter's shop.

Pretti has been researching Vargas, who died in the 1980s, and contacting those who knew him as a part of her restoration work.

"It's amazing what he's done, and how much of himself went into his work," Pretti said. "He was a very driven, devoted artist and Catholic who put his heart and soul into his work... Can you tell I'm into this project?"

Whitehead Film Festival **Focuses On Interdependence**


he Whitehead International Film Festival (WIFF) is a small annual festival located in Claremont. WIFF is inspired by the philosophy of Alfred North Whitehead - a worldview that focuses on the radically interdependent nature of all that exists. The festival brings together films from across the globe that touch on this interdependence.
