## Riley's Farm

For anyone who has watched "The Quiet Man" more than once, Riley's Farm in Oak Glen is offering a country setting

for your St. Patrick's Day celebration this year. In addition to horse drawn hayrides, the farm chefs will serve a traditional meal of Irish soda bread, corned beef, cabbage, Irish Stew, Roasted Red Potatoes and Bread pudding.

Freeman House and Kathy von Arx, along with the Andy Rau band, will play Irish music and backing up the Old Joe Quartet, singing Irish American parlor songs from the turn of the 20th century-the hay day of the Riley's Farm packing shed, where apples were once (and still are) prepared for market.

"St. Patrick's is too fun of a holiday to be left to the bars and night clubs," Jim Riley, one of the farm's owner-managers, said. "We're going to have little leprechauns running around and pots of chocolate gold for the little ones. Every year, towards St. Patrick's, we see more and more of the crafty little folks running around in the apple orchards, so we need some help tracking them down. The farm could use the gold."

Riley likes to point out that the Irish have a long and proud heritage within the United States. The Irish were part of the American experiment long before the potato famine. The northern Irish helped

settle New Hampshire in the 18th century. Paul Revere borrowed his famous horse from an Irish American, Deacon Larkin. The Irish have been valiant soldiers in all of America's conflict, and it is widely reported that Oak Glen itself was founded on St. Patrick's Day, when Enoch Parrish settled here for the first time.

"In most ways, of course, this will be a celebration of the way the Irish have come to live in, and affect, American culture," Riley said. "Many of the songs we think of as 'Irish,' 'My Wild Irish Rose,' 'McNamara's Band,' 'Harrigan' are really American songs written or influenced by the Irish. This will be a celebration of how two great cultures, American and Irish, came to grow together."

The legends of St. Patrick himself are as endearing as the Irish, including the story of the night Ireland's pagan king forbade any fires but to the king. St. Patrick's paschal torch burned in defiance of the tyrant and he defeated the Druid court and converted the pagan court and royal family to Christianity. St. Patrick was even rumored to have risen a giant from his grave, long enough to convert him and send him on to heaven.

That's the stuff that both legends and





# Meet the Megalodon!

hen you visit the MSAS Astronomy Village in Lake Arrowhead you may be greeted by plenty of wildlife on site. Hawks and eagles soar overhead.

Occasionally at sunrise, a bear, bobcat, or coyote might amble by the perimeter on their way home for a daytime nap. The garden plays host to a world of small creatures, including rabbits, birds, lizards, dragon flies, bees and butterflies.

Step inside to view the library displays and discover the remnants of ancient wildlife that lurk there. Among the exhibits you will find a curious set of teeth ... fossilized shark teeth, around 4 to 5 inches tall. The specimens are from giant sharks that lived between 1.5 and 25 million years ago during the Miocene and Pliocene Epochs. These creatures, known as Carcharodon (rough-tooth) megalodon (giant tooth) would have been between 40 to possibly 90 feet in length. They may have weighed between 70 and 80 thousand pounds or more. Their jaws could open about 6 feet wide and 7 to 9 feet high. C.

megalodon could have swallowed a small car or even a full-grown great white shark.

Although ancient shark fossils are very rare (they had no bones, only cartilage, which disintegrates rather than fossilizing), their teeth have been found all over the world in caves, rivers and embankments. The bone-like material, coated with hard enamel, fossilize so well that they are often found in perfect condition and highly prized by amateur collectors.

In keeping with a long-standing tradition of institutions naming their telescopes, the MSAS Astronomy Village named theirs "Megalodon." The customized optics and library of 200,000,000 objects provide research level viewing opportunities for public and private program participants.

"Megalodon" is housed in the Robert Brownlee Observatory which is open for viewing during SkyQuest Public Programs, school, and scheduled private programs (weather permitting). Attend the SkyQuest Public Program on Saturday, March 4, from 7-9:30pm. The topic is "The Planets of Our Solar System" and includes an entertaining and informative slide lecture, question and answer period, laser tour of the night sky,

## Speedway prepares for its 43rd season of racing

and hosted the first race in May of that same year. The Orange Show Speedway was a dirt rack until 1964 when it was paved over and stock car racing began in earnest.

In 2003, OSS was renovated and the old surface was completely removed, ground up and used as a base for the new track that included banking of 12 degrees in the turns and six degrees in the straight-a-ways. New asphalt was laid down and the existing track exit was moved from turn three area to the top of the turn two area. The new track exit is safer and more convenient for the racers bringing them down in front of the south grandstands and then to the pit area located behind the south grandstands. The pit area contains pit stalls for 90 competitors with more space as needed in other areas of the facility.

The Orange Show Speedway is an ASA Member Track since 2004 with plans to continue this association beyond 2006. Orange Show Speedway was the first California based track to sign with the ASA Member Track program back in 2004.

The Speedway has drawn many famous drivers to compete, including F1 World Champion Phil Hill, Indy 500 drivers and San Bernardino natives Swede Savage and Bill Scott, Johnny Parsons, Pancho Carter, Danny Ongias, Stan Fox, Billy Boat, Dan Gurney, the Vukovich's, and the Bettenhauser's, among many others. NASCAR drivers have included Winston Cup Champions Bill Elliot and Bobbie Allison, Donnie Allison, Sterling Marlin Hershal McGriff, Ron Esau, Ivan Baldwin, NASCAR Craftsman Truck Champion Ron Hornaday, Jr. and more.


When not hosting high-performance racing, OSS is used for sports exhibitions and large concerts. Concession stands, restrooms, and a seating capacity of 10,000 enable the Orange Show Speedway to accommodate events of all types.

The Orange Show Speedway is located at the NOS Events Center, home of the National Orange Show Festival in San Bernardino. Take the 215 freeway, exit at the Orange Show Road and go north on E Street approximately one half mile to Mill Street

Spectator gates open at 5pm and racing action gets underway at 6:30pm. Admission is \$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors and military, \$2 for juniors 6 to 12 and children under 5 are free.







The organization is run by parents and through their volunteerism the children are also able to participate in two full-scale musical productions each year. Live orchestras and colorful



## Rollicking 'Play' delivers smart humor


The Riverside Community Players' next production is the delightful and intricate comedy The Play's the Thing by Ferenc Molnar, adapted by P.G. Wodehouse, which first ran on Broadway in 1926 and was last revived there in 1948.

The audience is transported to a gorgeous castle overlooking the Italian Riviera on a beautiful summer's eve, circa 1920 where Sandor Turai (Alan Price), a witty and celebrated playwright, is staying with his collaborator, Mansky (Wayne Astin), and their young composer, Albert (Trevor Boles). Turai has arranged for Albert's fiancée, the prima donna Ilona Szabo (Kerry Jones), to occupy an adjoining suite. Misfortune strikes when, through the paper-thin walls, the three men hear llona arrive with her former lover, the aging-Lothario actor Almady (Ken Lay). Their amorous exchange seems to doom Albert's romance, and he threatens to destroy the score he dedicated to her, until Turai launches an elaborate scheme to convince him Ilona and Almady were actually rehearsing a play.

From its convention-bending, wink-at-theaudience opening to its punch line ending, The Play's the Thing is a whole lot of fun – a wonderful mixture of sophistication and satire where Oscar Wilde and Noel Coward would feel right at home. Though often described as "a classic farce," the play is far from the rollicking, bawdy comedy commonly associated with the genre. Rather, the humor is subtle, highbrow, and yet never pretentious.

In keeping with its mission to provide affordable live theater for all, CATS introduces with this production "discount previews" which will open each of its shows this season.




Steve Gaghagen (right) directs John Wells and Beth Gardner as they prepare for "The Lion in Winter."


