

ince 2013, the City of Riverside has been leading the Inland region when it launched GrowRIVERSIDE (growriv. com) to develop a local food economy that increases access to nutritious foods by creating economic opportunities in a sustainable manner. Specifically, GrowRIVERSIDE encompasses seven pillars:

- Assist growers and producer groups
- Create local jobs
- Develop value added products and build local demand
- Reduce food waste
- Improve food access and health equity
- Build distribution capacity
- Ensure results

Since its inception, GrowRIVERSIDE has become an important component of Riverside's community and economic development strategy. It encompasses a cohesive plan to increase community and economic development in food and agricultural activities to activate an estimated 1,000 acres of vacant agriculturally-zoned land in Riverside's 4,800-acre Arlington Heights Greenbelt and increase food and agricultural activities across the city. The activities and efforts of the initiative are carried out in collaboration with multiple partners including the Riverside Food Systems Alliance.

RAMONA Our History, Our Legacy

hen Helen Hunt Jackson wrote her story "Ramona" she intended it to be a tale of injustice and the abuse of the Native Americans. Little did she know it would turn out to be one of the most enduring love stories of the 20th Century. Biographer Ruth Odell wrote of Jackson, "Her contact with the Indians set off a fuse of idealism she had not known she possessed." And while she was an advocate for the tribes in our local area, she also wrote a novel that drew people to California in droves to visit the romantic locales describe in "Ramona". The tale of Ramona and Alessandro brought tourists to California as never before.

In 1913 Chester Kline, publisher and editor of The San Jacinto Valley Register, wrote an article suggesting that the city weave the story of Ramona into the activities of the annual carnival. He pointed out that the first chapters of the book "teems with references to the San Jacinto Valley". Several people were interested but it was






members of the Hemet Chamber of Commerce who finally got the job done and hired Garnett Holme to write and direct the first production of "Ramona" in 1923.

A wooden stage with a cheesecloth backdrop and the audience sitting on blankets and rocks was the setting for the first performance. Now with 95 years have come many improvements in both the setting and accommodations for the audience; there has even been an update to the play itself.

However, the spirit of the play has remained the same. The injustice to the Native Americans still rings through but over the seasons the play has added more of the celebration of the Native American traditions. The Red Tail Spirit Dancers share the joy of the Elder blessing in a way that is beautiful and authentic. Internationally







recognized Hoop dancer Terry Goedel amazes with his performance.

When the novel was first published the tourists came to California to see the setting of the story fascinated by the portrayal of life on a rancho, to see where Ramona and Alessandro lived and died. Much of Jackson's novel uses true life occurrences; a Native American was killed by Sam Temple and his trial was held in San Jacinto, there were tribes in danger of losing their lands - in fact Jackson herself hired a lawyer who defended the Soboba tribe and helped them keep their land.

When the valley residents chose the site of the Ramona Pageant, they wanted the audience to be able to appreciate the beauty and grandeur of the natural setting. Every spring the hills come alive with the spectacle of the Ramona Pageant, the color of the Spanish dancers, the surprise of the Rock Indians, the excitement of the Cowboys as they ride the newly restored Americana trail, and the power and majesty of the ceremonies of the Native Americans.

Coming to see *Ramona* should be an all day event. The gates to the Bowl open at 1:30pm and it is well worth it to arrive then. Enjoy



the entertainment in the courtyard. Eat at the Kiwanis BBQ, or for a sit down experience with the most spectacular view in the valley eat at the Ramona Terrace. You can visit the museum which tells the story of "Ramona" performances back to 1923. The gift shop has a variety of Ramona themed items.

Seats for the play vary from the up close seats in the lower section to the box seats at the top of the amphitheatre that are shaded and include waitress service. Standard pricing ranges from \$28 to \$47. Take advantage of the local discount price of only \$20 for those who live in the San Jacinto Valley and Idyllwild.

The Ramona Pageant is truly a spectacle at its finest. That is why it is the longest running outdoor drama in America and California's Official Outdoor Play. If you have never seen "Ramona" make this year the one where you learn the history and romance of the valley you live in. Become a part of the legacy that makes us so special!

General admission is \$49 per person; and \$39 for Palm Springs Air Museum members. Admission includes the live music and food. The bar is no host.

Aircraft from the Korea and Vietnam eras will be on display inside the Miles Hangar, and there will even be a MASH tent. Perhaps some will even come dressed as MASH doctors and nurses.

Live entertainment is by Anonymous 5. The Anonymous 5 dates back to 1965 when some Southern California high school friends, after watching the Beatles and the Rolling Stones on Ed Sullivan, decided to form a rock and roll band. Of the original five, the three original band members still performing are Kerry Hagney on guitar, Vince Mercurio on bass guitar, and Gary Marzolino also on guitar.

A year later, 1966, Stan Stokes joined the band as the keyboard player and is still in the band. In later years, the band was joined by Vinney Mastrosimone on drums, Bob Gongwer on guitar, Jan Maletz on guitar and vocals and Jennifer Maletz on vocals. The band plays rock and roll from the 1960's and 70's along with a bit of everything else.

THE PALM SPRINGS AIR MUSEUM

The Palm Springs Air Museum is an educational non-profit organization, with over 59 flying and static aircraft on display. Included in the four hangars of 86,000 square feet of climate controlled hangar space are exhibits detailing events from World War II, the Korea and Vietnam conflicts.

The hangars are themed, and divided into the B-17 hangar, the European / Army Hangar, the Pacific / Navy hangar, and the newest hangar, the Gen. Miles Korea and Vietnam Hangar.

In addition to the 14 World War II warbirds on display, are several jet airplanes and helicopters. Of the five aircraft licensed to fly, making appearances at airshows, and doing flight exhibitions at the Palm Springs Air Museum, there are two that are able to carry passengers. The C-47 can carry up to 5 passengers, and flights cost \$195 per person. The P-51 Red Tail Mustang (the race horse of the sky) carries one passenger, and costs \$1,895 per person per flight. The P-51 Experience includes commemorative Red Tail poster, cap, and T-shirt.

The Palm Springs Air Museum is open daily from 10 am to 5 pm. Commemorative Programs with flight exhibitions occur on Saturdays from November through May. Admission ranges from \$17 for adults down to \$10 for children 6 through 12. Active military and their immediate families with ID, and children 5 and under get in free.





'All Too Human'

New art exhibit explores the emotional work of Mark Strickland

hat does it mean to be human? This question is at the center of a new exhibition at The Robert and Frances Fullerton Museum of Art at the Cal State San Bernardino campus, featuring the deeply emotional and moving artworks of southern California artist Mark Strickland. All Too Human: The Art of Mark Strickland will highlight the artist's lifelong exploration of the human condition including both the flaws in human nature resulting in tragedies and falls and the enduring human spirit, dignity, and compassion.

Strickland first began his lifelong study of humanity at UCLA where he earned his B.A. in psychology. Finding the field to be too academic, he turned to art as a way to express himself and find answers to the burning questions he had about the world around him. Why is there such a duality between the cruel, evil and tragic things that plague our lives and the compassion, kindness and hope that humanity is so capable of? Much of his work focuses on investigating what he considers the "forgotten society" – such as the homeless, elderly, or ill – but also incorporates grander scale concepts such as immigration, the American dream, or the Holocaust.

Strickland's findings are displayed through dramatic, large scale paintings and intensely



realistic sculptures that reveal a message of great hope amidst the suffering.

All Too Human: The Art of Mark Strickland is on display now through May 19. An artist talk will be held in conjunction with the exhibition on Thursday, April 19, 6-8 p.m.


