

RAMONA

91 Years Of The Outdoor Play That Touched The Heart Of The Country

n the late 1800's a very prolific author named Helen Hunt Jackson was so distraught with the Federal Government's treatment of Native American Tribes throughout the country that she wrote a book entitled "Century of Dishonor" and delivered a copy to every member of Congress. This failed to move the government to right the grave injustices against Native Americans; however they did hire Mrs. Jackson to do a report of the California Mission Indians throughout our region.

When this report failed to move them to action, Mrs. Jackson thought of her peers who through their fictional literary work had brought great attention to their subjects in *Hiawatha* and *Uncle Tom's Cabin*. So, she decided to write a

book that would move the hearts and minds of a nation.

In 1884 Helen Hunt Jackson finished her novel *Ramona*. Although it was a work of fiction, it included many true experiences that she had recorded in her travels in Southern California while doing her report for the Federal Government. Sadly, Ms. Jackson died the following year of cancer and complications from a bad fall and was not able to fully appreciate the impact of her book. *Ramona* turned out to be a very popular book not only then but to this day has never gone out of print.

In 1921 the communities of Hemet and San Jacinto came together to hire Garnet Holme to write a play based on *Ramona*. He found a location with perfect acoustical properties and the first performance of *Ramona* the play was in April of 1923 in what is now the Ramona Bowl Amphitheatre located in the southern hillsides of Hemet on 160 acres.

The Amphitheatre is in a beautiful setting that seats 5,400. Over 600 volunteer cast members and support staff donate their time and talent each year to entertain and educate audiences with one of the most enduring stories of early California history.

With each passing year, Helen Hunt Jackson's powerful message has come alive to remind audiences of this tragic chapter in our history. Powerful and commanding, *Ramona* has been seen by millions of people. Time has not diminished her impact. Each year as they bring to life this epic tale of survival and determination, we are reminded of the tenacity of the human spirit.

They are celebrating their 91st anniversary of producing California's Official Outdoor






