

## Hitchcock Fridays Film Festival Classic Hitchcock of the 1940s and 1950s

Sir Alfred Joseph Hitchcock was an English Film director and producer. He pioneered many techniques in the suspense and psychological thriller genres.

Hitchcock directed more than fifty feature films in a career spanning six decades and is often regarded as the greatest British filmmaker. The magazine MovieMaker has described him as the most influential filmmaker of all time, and he is widely regarded as one of cinema's most significant artists.

Through his cameo appearances in his own films, interviews, film trailers, and the television program Alfred Hitchcock Presents, he became a cultural icon.





## Pageant Of The Masters Director Rolls Out Red Carpet For 'The Big Picture'

## Pageant Celebrates 80 years of living pictures

iane Challis Davy, director of the Pageant of the Masters, is busily putting the finishing touches on this summer's celebration of art in "living pictures" – tableaux vivants – entitled *The Big Picture*. In addition to being a tribute to the history of motion pictures and the ways in which masterpieces of art have inspired and informed the movies, this summer's production will also celebrate the 80th anniversary of living pictures being presented at the Festival of Arts in Laguna Beach.

When asked where she found her inspiration for the 2013 theme, Challis Davy laughed and replied, "In the bathtub!" She then went on to explain this was a reference to Busby Berkeley, the legendary Hollywood director famous for his extravagant and brilliantly-choreographed musical numbers in the 1930s. Berkeley, it seems, once told a reporter that his best ideas came to him while in the tub.

Challis Davy's playful comment is offset by the seriousness of her continuing devotion to the

daunting logistics of putting on the Pageant. With its two casts of hundreds of volunteers, orchestra, narrator and crew of backstage artists and technicians, the Pageant of the Masters is every bit as complex as a big-budget movie shoot, with the biggest difference being that a movie only has to get a shot right once, while the Pageant hits the stage live every night for nearly two months!

Challis Davy is quick to point out that masterpieces are once again front and center in the 2013 Pageant. "We'll have Vermeer, Gainsborough, Michelangelo, Gerome, Seurat, Norman Rockwell. Designers for both stage and screen look to paintings and sculpture for historical information and inspiration. I thought it would be a new twist for the Pageant to take a look back at the work of the Masters that inspired great works of cinema."

As examples, *The Big Picture* will showcase how the genius of Michelangelo found expression in "The Agony and the Ecstasy," how Thomas Gainsborough's portraits influenced Stanley Kubrick, and how the works of Jean-Leon Gerome provided inspiration for films by directors like David Lean and Ridley Scott. And "the Master of Suspense," Alfred Hitchcock, will also merit special attention.

But, Challis Davy's enthusiasm for the theme extends beyond film references. "What are movies but a series of still pictures?" she mused. "The Pageant is a series of still (but living) pictures. That seemed like an interesting connection to consider."

Longtime Pageant scriptwriter Dan Duling concurred. "The Pageant's combination of art and theater alters the way we look at art. In a way tableaux vivants were the original 'freeze frames.' And looking at masterpieces through the viewfinder of motion pictures provides fascinating food for thought."

When asked if there were any selections for the upcoming show that she'd always wanted to produce, Challis Davy cited the chance to incorporate

memorable music from the movies by Bernard Hermann, Alex North and other composers, and the chance to recreate a fresco by Michelangelo from the Sistine Chapel. On a lighter note, she said she's looking forward to staging "a loving tribute to the Art Institute of Chicago Art, courtesy of director John Hughes and his film Ferris Bueller's Day Off."

Of course, *The Big Picture* has a secondary focus, the 80th anniversary of "living pictures" at the Festival of Arts. That's certainly worthy of celebration, and Challis Davy intends to revisit this remarkable history by highlighting some of the ways in which the Pageant has benefited from its connections with Hollywood celebrities. And, once again, the show will conclude with its traditional finale, Leonardo da Vinci's "The Last Supper." In 1936, that truly became "the big picture" that put the Pageant on the national map.

Everyone associated with the production understands the Pageant wouldn't be possible without the dedication of its volunteers in the two casts and working behind the scenes. As Challis Davy acknowledges, their dedication and loyalty are the remarkable engines that sustain the Pageant. "I'm lucky to be surrounded by people who love the hard work it takes to produce a very elaborate show," she said. "I get inspiration from the scriptwriter, staff, composers, and from the scores of enthusiastic research volunteers who come up with great suggestions!"

The Pageant of the Masters will perform nightly from Sunday, July 7, through Saturday, Aug. 31. Tickets for *The Big Picture* can be purchased by calling 1-800-487-3378, or going online at www.PageantTickets.com. Tickets start at \$15. A Pageant ticket entitles you to free unlimited admission to the Festival of Arts grounds where you can enjoy original artwork by 140 of Southern Orange County's finest artists, art classes, musical entertainment, special art events, dining at Gina's Alfresco and so much more. production. The concept of the dream ballet, which became a staple in future Broadway productions, was created by Agnes DeMille for the original production in 1943. One can't produce *Oklahoma!* without including the dream ballet, as the plot depends on it. I'm very excited about our presentation of this classic work. *Oklahoma!* just celebrated its 70th birthday, having opened on Broadway on

March 31, 1943, three months after America was plunged into war. With the opening song, 'Oh What A Beautiful Mornin, Oh What A Beautiful Day' and 'All The Sounds Of The Earth Are Like Music,' the musical gave everyone hope, became a smash hit, and helped to get the country through the horrors of the war and the emotions of the times. It ran for five years. Perhaps it's time, once again, for a little comfort musical! Treat yourself! You will leave the theatre feeling wonderful!"

She has managed to save a goodly sum of money for the high-end beauty parlor she dreams of opening. Her hope of finding love, however, has been more elusive. When she begins a correspondence with a man working on the Panama Canal it seems this dream, too, may soon arrive. Intimate Apparel is a play with adult content and is appropriate for mature audiences only.

This atypical Christie play blends her legendary mystery writing with a light comic tone also seen in her Miss Marple novels.

Spider's Web opens March 28th and plays through April 13th, 2014.

Adapted by Mark Brown, Jules Verne's classic **Around the World in 80 Days** will also be presented by RCP this season. Fearless adventurer Phileas Fogg has agreed to an outrageous wager that puts his fortune and his life at risk. It is 1872 and with his resourceful servant, Passepartout, Fogg sets out to circle the globe in an unheard-of 80 days. This task leaves Fogg with difficulties enough, but a Scotland Yard Detective named Fix is convinced that Fogg is the gentleman bandit who recently robbed an English bank and dogs Fogg's

## A Mission To Help

In 1959 a wildfire swept across the Big Bear Mountains and in its aftermath a number of injured and orphaned forest creatures were found. The original animals brought in were an orphaned baby black bear and two bobcats.

Word spread and before long more animals came that were in need of care. Sometimes that care was a bit of rehabilitation ending with their release back to the wild. For others, the Big Bear Alpine Zoo (formerly known as the Moonridge Animal Park) became their "home for life." It has become a sanctuary for injured and orphaned critters.

The zoo is operated by the County of San Bernardino, Big Bear Valley Recreation and Park District. Their 50-year lease has expired and plans are underway to try to relocate the zoo to another, larger Big Bear site.

Every animal is accessed by Debbie Richardson, the curator, and her staff of zookeepers. Every effort is made to rehabilitate each animal with the intent of returning it to the wild. The ones they keep are so impacted by their situation that they could never make it if returned to the wild.

Alaska, a bald eagle, came from Seattle's Woodland Park Zoo in 1991. He was a gunshot victim and is missing most of his right wing.

Aurora, an Artic Fox, arrived in 2012. She was stranded on a rooftop in Beverly Hills and it took 3 days for Animal Control to capture her. Since Arctic Foxes are considered a restricted species by Fish and Game and cannot be released in California she was sent to the zoo.






