American Indian Art in Riverside

Americana Indian Shows brings authentic Native American arts to the public

sale, the Anderson's Americana Indian Show is perhaps the largest event of its kind to be found in the Inland Empire. For purveyors of traditional, Native American jewelry and arts, the Riverside show can't be beat.

Coming to the Elks Lodge in Riverside on Sept 27 - Sept 29, the show puts on display for sale everything from turquoise jewelry to Navajo rugs.

Americana Indian Shows had its beginning in 1947 when founder Lee Anderson (a fifth generation Arizonan) attended school on the Navajo reservation and worked after school and weekends for his uncle at the family's Sanders, Arizona trading post. The Andersons collected American Indian art such as Navajo rugs, pottery, baskets, jewelry and other Indian and western items. This

cultivated a passion and respect for Native American art and culture that inspired Lee to pursue his dream of bringing Indian art to the public. In 1966 Lee and his brothers, Wayne and Arvid, began selling Navajo weavings on a small scale at local flea markets and events in Tucson, while Lee was stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. As sales grew, the brothers expanded inventory to include jewelry and other Indian arts; with their success came the founding of Americana Indian shows in 1968.

Upon retirement from the Pentagon in 1974, Lee moved his family from Virginia back to Arizona to pursue the business full time with his brothers. Two galleries were opened in 1974, and at the same time road shows continued to take art and jewelry to customers across the country. Eventually the galleries were closed so Lee and his brothers could focus exclusively on conducting shows and sales nationwide.

Today that tradition continues with the next generation of Andersons. The shows – more than 25 a year around the country – feature an inventory of thousands of Native American made items from Arizona and New Mexico, including

turquoise jewelry, kachinas, paintings, baskets, sand paintings, pottery, carvings, Navajo rugs and more. Visitors can shop for works created by top Native American artists from the Navajo, Hopi, Zuni, Santo Domingo, Acoma, Santa Clara, Jemez and more.



Making Iced Tea

A treat for your taste buds by DragonMarsh

PREPARATION Use 1 oz of loose tea to 1 gallon of water. Remember your tea is only as good as your tea and water so use filtered water, not tap water! Why waste good tea with bad water!

COOL INFUSED: Cold brewed tea is done in the refrigerator, it also helps reduce the risk related to sun brewed tea that can harbor bacteria since it is warm, but not hot enough to kill any growing bacteria. Place loose tea in sanitized container (muslin bags are great) then pour water over tea. Place in refrigerator for 10-16 hours or overnight. Remove the tea bag/tea ball and drink within 72 hours. If your Ice tea is getting cloudy it is going bad. If it is growing mold or fuzzy bits, it is definitely bad ... throw it out in the garden or compost pile! For added flavor, add slices of citrus or strawberries. Try less or more tea for different tastes.

HOT INFUSED: Make your hot tea as you would normally. Use twice as many tea leaves, since the addition of ice cubes to the hot brew will dilute the taste considerably. Allow tea to cool before refrigerating. Don't pour hot tea in plastic "lemonade/tea" dispensers. The hot tea will warp the container into a melted mess, trust me. Another option is to make ice cubes from tea so they will not dilute the drink.

Try different teas, hot and cold, for different flavors. Many people like the flavor of a green tea chilled who would not drink it hot. Try adding lemon, agave or honey. Life is too short to drink inferior tea! Treat your taste buds today!



and myriad forms of percussion. Audiences should even anticipate the ethereal sonorities of tubular bells, the harp, and ethereal strings and, as a special addition, the all-female choir composed of CSUSB current vocal students and alumni will lend their voices to the Neptune movement.

American composer, conductor, and pianist John Williams' Star Wars selections will draw from the original and prequel trilogies utilizing an eclectic variety of musical styles, many culled from the Late Romantic idiom of Richard Strauss and his contemporaries. With several obvious nods to Holst in the original scores, Williams incorporated more strains of modernist orchestral writing with each progressive score thought to involve director George Lucas' desire to ground the otherwise strange and fantastic setting in well-known, audience-accessible music. Audiences will be transported to Tatooine and beyond through the simple and direct emotional appeal of this music.

Williams' E.T. Adventures on Earth rounds out this singularly space age evening with selections from the sweeping, emotionally uplifting soundtrack of Steven Spielberg's most beloved family film. Utilizing the Grammy-winning score, full of both mischief and darkness, will evoke images of the life-changing adventures of Elliot, Gertie, and their extraterrestrial friend in what Gary Arnold of The Washington Post called: "essentially a spiritual autobiography." Concert-goers may even hear a bit of Yoda's Theme from The Empire Strikes Back in movements from The Magic of Halloween. The multitude of themes for E.T. merge to form a spectacular accompaniment for the 1982 film
