

American Indian Art In Riverside

Americana Indian Shows brings authentic Native American arts to the public



AMERICAN INDIAN ART Sept. 26-28, Anderson's Americana Indian Show puts on display for sale everything from turquoise jewelry to Navajo rugs.

ith more than 5,000 authentic items for sale, the Anderson's Americana Indian Show is perhaps the largest event of its kind to be found in the Inland Empire. For purveyors of traditional, Native American jewelry and arts, the Riverside show can't be beat.

Coming to the Elks Lodge in Riverside on September 26 – September 28, the show puts on display for sale everything from turquoise jewelry to Navajo rugs.

Americana Indian Shows had its beginning in 1947 when founder Lee Anderson (a fifth generation Arizonan) attended school on the Navajo reservation and worked after school and weekends for his uncle at the family's Sanders, Arizona trading post. The Andersons collected American Indian art such as Navajo rugs, pottery, baskets, jewelry and other Indian and western items. This cultivated a passion and respect for Native American art and culture that inspired Lee to pursue his dream of bringing Indian art to the public. In 1966 Lee and his brothers, Wayne and Arvid, began selling Navajo weavings on a small scale at local flea markets and events in Tucson, while Lee was stationed at Fort Huachuca, Arizona. As sales grew, the brothers expanded inventory to include Jewelry and other Indian arts; with their success came the founding of Americana Indian shows in 1968.



Upon retirement from the Pentagon in 1974, Lee moved his family from Virginia back to Arizona to pursue the business full time with his brothers. Two galleries were opened in 1974, and at the same time road shows continued to take art and jewelry to customers across the country. Eventually the galleries were closed so Lee and his brothers could focus exclusively on conducting shows and sales nationwide.

Today that tradition continues with the next generation of Andersons. The shows – more than 25 a year around the country – feature an inventory of thousands of Native American made items from Arizona and New Mexico, including turquoise jewelry, kachinas, paintings, baskets, sand paintings, pottery, carvings, Navajo rugs and more. Visitors can shop for works created by top Native American artists from the Navajo, Hopi, Zuni, Santo Domingo, Acoma, Santa Clara, Jemez and more.










A Day Out With Thomas the Tank Engine & Friends

Over 200 rail cars and locomotives, ranging from Los Angeles street cars to modern diesel locomotives, are preserved at the museum's 90-acre site in Perris, California, which is open 363 days of the year.

The Riverside Citrus Classic


Proceeds benefit local education


Downtown Farmers Market

I.E. Restaurant Week Announces Second 10-Day Dining Event in October

A successful inaugural event in March has restaurants and diners clamoring for another regional dining experience Oct. 17-26 in communities throughout Riverside and San Bernardino counties



n enthusiastic response to the region's very first Inland Empire Restaurant Week this spring has prompted organizers to announce a second event in the fall, with participating restaurants offering a variety of delectable dishes at fixed prices for both lunch and dinner.

The region's second Inland Empire Restaurant Week will take place Oct. 17-26 at participating restaurants in communities throughout Riverside and San Bernardino counties. There are no tickets, passes or coupons required. Simply dine out at a participating restaurant for great meals at set prices. It's a great way to try a new restaurant or enjoy an old favorite.

Multi-course lunch menus will be offered for \$10, \$15 or \$20. Dinners will be offered at \$20, \$30 or \$40. Visit www.inlandempirerestaurant-week.com for details as they come.

Thousands of new customers visited participating restaurants in more than 20 communities during the inaugural event March 21-30. Restaurants reported increased sales of up to 30 percent and thousands of new customers visited their establishments to take advantage of the specialty menus offered at fixed prices. Participating restaurants benefitted from promotions and marketing of the 10-day event through radio,

print, digital and outdoor advertising and earned media, representing a total value of more than \$400,000.

"We saw a huge increase in reservations from the moment IE Restaurant Week was announced," said Rosie O'Connor, chef/owner of Provecho Grill in the city of Menifee. "We doubled our covers during the dining period and had many new customers who were so excited that we were participating. We will definitely sign up for the next restaurant week!"

The first Inland Empire Restaurant Week reflected an overall economic impact to the region of about \$1.1 million, according to the Greater Ontario Convention and Visitors Bureau, which organized and coordinated the event. Michael Krouse, President and CEO of the Greater Ontario Convention & Visitors Bureau, said everyone was thrilled with the response to what was the very first regional restaurant week for the region. He expects the October's Inland Empire Restaurant Week to be even bigger and better.

"Every corner of the Inland Empire was represented in our first event, which is why we are moving forward with a second Restaurant Week this fall," Krouse said. "I.E. Restaurant Week provides restaurants with a unique opportunity to attract new customers, and gives diners the chance to enjoy restaurants they've never experienced before."

Participating restaurants in the inaugural event were located mostly in Ontario, Rancho Cucamonga, Riverside and Claremont, but also included many other communities from Temecula to Big Bear, Beaumont to Corona. Some of the more popular restaurants included Market

Broiler, Mustazzoli Ristorante Italiano, Magic Lamp, Gyu-Kaku, Sycamore Inn, Las Campanas at the Mission Inn, The Pines Steakhouse, Bin 189, Salted Pig and many more.

"It was a great event, well organized and professionally executed," said Loren Lawe, Executive Chef of Riverside's Mission Inn. "We saw a significant increase in new customers at all of our participating restaurants, and we would love to do it again in the future."

Nearly 90 percent of the restaurants surveyed reported that IE Restaurant Week attracted new customers to their establishments.

44th Annual Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest Expands German Entertainment

Weekends, September 13 through October 25

he Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest celebrates 44 years of German style family fun and good times. Rated Southern California's #1 Oktoberfest, this fall's festival once again will expand the entertainment line-up to feature two bands from Germany and more free contests.

The Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest has continuously expanded its entertainment offerings over the past five years, providing guests with a wide variety of music, dance groups and contests. With the addition of the outside Spaten Rocktoberfest stage last year, Oktoberfest visitors can now enjoy traditional Oktober-

fest German bands and a variety of Country, Classic Rock and Blues bands. This year the event will feature two German bands playing over three of the seven weekends.


his vivid worlds and strong characters is a dream come true."




