





TREAT YOURSELF TO THIS UNIQUE MOUNTAIN ZOO

alifornia has some of the most diverse wildlife in North America. But you don't have to camp out in the wilderness just to catch a glimpse of some of our state's amazing animals. The Big Bear Alpine Zoo, founded in 1959, is the only alpine zoo of its kind in the United States. Situated at almost 7,000 feet above sea level, the Big Bear Alpine Zoo serves as a rehabilitation facility for both mountain and nearby communities. With a nearly 80% success rate, animals are nursed back to health or weaned onto solid foods and then released back into the wild. If an animal is too injured or if it has lost its fear of humans, it cannot be released and has a home

"Our goal at the zoo is to connect our guests to wildlife, to demonstrate both the uniqueness of our animals and their habitat in the wild," says Curator Bob Cisneros. "As for our animals, we focus on their natural behaviors, providing them with opportunities to thrive. I think this combination of connecting guests to wildlife and meeting the welfare needs of our animals makes us very successful at what we do."

If you are planning a trip to Big Bear, get your wild on! A visit to the zoo is the best way to see representatives of our mountain ecosystem. Located on 2.5 acres, Big Bear Alpine Zoo brings the wild to you, housing over 100 animals, mostly native species.

The zoo is open daily from 10am through 5pm and is located at 43285 Goldmine Drive in Big Bear Lake, right across the street from Bear Mountain Ski and Board Resort.

Each day at noon there is an animal presentation done by one of their keepers and



three animal enrichment talks at 1pm, 2pm, and 3pm.

The Big Bear Lake Oktoberfest has continuously expanded its entertainment offerings over the past five years, providing guests with a wide





The FAIR-Southern California Fair Returns

he Southern California Fair opens its 103rd annual fair at the Southern California Fairgrounds on Saturday, Oct. 1 running through Sunday, Oct. 9.

The 9-day event will include exhibits, livestock, live entertainment (racing pigs, community entertainers, street performers, hypnotist), bull-riding, motorcycle racing, motocross jumping, Hispanic entertainers, a carnival, and much more. All shows, entertainers, concerts and free acts are always free with admission.

The fair concert series continues with multiple days of quality entertainers.

Shooter Jennings - Oct. 3

Shooter Jennings will perform at the fair at 7:30pm on Monday, October 3.

Shooter Jennings is the only son of country legends Waylon Jennings and Jessi Colter who spent his childhood on the tour bus of both legends. Born Waylon Albright Jennings, Shooter was displaying his musical talents at five years old by taking piano lessons, but broke off his grasp of the piano and discovered the guitar at fourteen years old.

Along with the guitar he found rock and roll, and leaned heavily toward Southern rock similar to the loose limbed rock of Guns N' Roses. Soon thereafter he moved from Nashville to Los Angeles where he assembled a rock band called Stargunn which earned a strong local reputation for its live shows, and enjoyed a six year run on the Los Angeles circuit before he rediscovered his country roots and dissolved the band.

Jennings put together a band with country

roots, The 357s. Shooter Jennings and the band produced a rambunctious country album called *Put the O Back in Country*. Following in his father's footsteps, but with a feisty and scrappy sense of country, Jennings placed himself in a position to explore and carve out his own brand of success in country music.

A second album, *Electric Rodeo*, appeared in 2006, followed by a live set, *Live at Irving Plaza*, later in the year. Jennings' third solo, *The Wolf*, was released in October 2007.

Shooter Jennings renamed his backup band Hierophant for his fourth studio album, *Black Ribbons*, a concept record which appeared in 2010.

His album, *The Other Life*, was released on his own Black Country Rock label. *The Other Live*, Jennings' second live album, recorded during his 2014 tour and featured many songs from the *The Other Life*.

Jessie James Decker and Temecula Road - Oct. 5

Jessie James Decker and Temecula Road perform On Oct. 5 at the Southern California Fair.

Jessie James Decker began singing at the age of two and hasn't stopped making noise. In 2009, Jessie released her debut album featuring the hit single "Wanted." The same year, Jessie traveled to the Middle East with Kid Rock to perform for troops stationed overseas.

Her "Comin Home" EP hit number one on iTunes upon its release in April 2014 and debuted in the top 5 on Billboard's Top Country Albums chart.

Jessie wrapped 2014 with the release of her holiday single, "Baby! It's Christmas," which hit number one on iTunes' top holiday songs chart. She was also brought on as co-host for the fourth season of CMT's *Redneck Island* with Steve Austin.

Showing no signs of slowing down, Jessie kicked off 2015 with the release of her new single, "Clint Eastwood." Now, with nearly 3 million fans following her every move on social media, Jessie is ready to bring her music and style to the masses.

"I want girls to feel good about who they are and feel secure and feel confident. I feel like that's my message to people," she said.

Jessie performs with Temecula Road, named after the city they grew up in (Temecula, California). Sisters Maddie Salute, 15, and Emma Salute, 17, have been singing together for years, and recently joined forces with longtime friend Dawson Anderson, 16, to form Temecula Road. Noted for their impeccable harmonies, the trio writes their own original material, backed by Dawson on guitar and Emma on mandolin.

Chosen by The Huffington Post as one of the top country artists to watch in 2016, the trio has opened for Joe Nichols, Eli Young Band, and Jessie James Decker on a nationwide, sold out tour. They also joined Kenny Rogers for a string of dates on his farewell tour.

With a combination of skills far beyond their years and an infectious, youthful energy, expect to see much more from Temecula Road very soon.

LA RAMS AND LA DODGERS GREATS TO MEET & GREET FANS AT FAIR



Original New Wave Band, Martha Davis & The Motels, On Stage at the Lewis Family Playhouse



Led by the unmistakable and timeless singer/songwriter Martha Davis, the group scored big with hits including Only the Lonely, Suddenly Last Summer, Total Control, Mission of Mercy, Shame, and Danger. With an 80's revival now in full swing, Martha Davis & The Motels are back on the road pleasing their legions of fans.

They perform on September 17, at 8pm. Tickets for Gold Level Seating are priced at \$40 for General Admission and \$38 for Seniors. All Platinum Level Seating is priced at \$45.

Born on January 15, 1951, in Berkeley, CA, Martha Davis earned great acclaim as the frontwoman and guiding artistic force with the Los Angeles band the Motels during the 1980's. Now, in their most current reincarnation, Martha Davis and the Motels continue to captivate audiences offering a window back in time. It is no





debate that Martha Davis has earned a place as one of the more influential and riveting female artists of the 80's.
